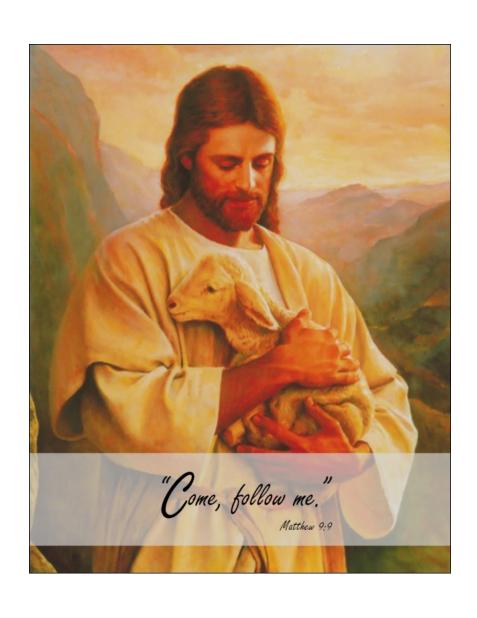

Spring Council Meeting Minutes May 19, 2021

Hanover Church of the Brethren Spring Council Meeting met with 28 members present.

A welcome was extended by Pastor Gerry Godfrey, opening the meeting with a litany and hymn, followed by prayer. Moderator Pastor Dick Godfrey followed with scripture from the Gospel of John, a brief meditation on "What is Truth?" closing with prayer.

A motion was made by Sharon Hershey to approve the agenda after the addition of Item C: Information Regarding Pastor's Retirement. Motion was seconded by Melissa Godfrey. The motion passed and the agenda was approved.

A motion was made by Phyllis Fuhrman to approve the Fall Council Meeting Minutes from October 21, 2020. Motion was seconded by Connie Morris. The motion passed and the minutes were approved.

Board Chair Report: Scott Ruth had no report.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Gerry presented her report as written. She advised members that she has not been able to make hospital visitations due to the Coronovirus situation; however, nursing homes are now starting to open up with scheduled appointments.

Treasurer's Report: Alan Bridenbaugh presented the financial report as written. Members were informed at the end of March the Checking Account Balance was at \$44,375; taking into account Planned Future Expenses, money available for spending 3/31/21 was \$23,560.

A motion was made by Bob Long to accept the Board Chair Report, Pastor's Report and Financial Report as presented or written. Motion was seconded by Mike Lawrence. The motion passed and the reports were all accepted.

Commission Reports:

- A. Melissa Godfrey presented the Christian Education report as printed.
- B. Amanda Jacobs-Womer presented the Fellowship and Personnel report as printed.
- C. Bob Long presented the Ministry and Worship report as printed.
- D. Phyllis Fuhrman presented the report for Outreach as printed. She fielded questions concerning Community Aid/Thrift Shop. The church will receive money from CA but only for clothing and shoes. The number assigned to HCOB must be used: 20020. The next church sponsored-clothing drive is June 19. Pastor Gerry reported CA is continuing to support other community non-profits.
- E. Bob Meminger presented the Property and Finance report as printed. Thanks was expressed to Melissa Godfrey for taking care of the many cleaning/safety required items related to the COVID issues.
 - Bob related some of the past history regarding possible replacement/relocation of the damaged street sign. Hanover Borough has used our previous sign location for a stop sign. Another safety concern is the site triangle (visibility). Foursquare Church (now EMERGE) has not returned telephone calls regarding the sign placement. It's been suggested that due to a large portion of the public using electronic GPS navigation systems it might not be necessary to replace the sign. *Amy Despines made a motion to forget about the sign replacement, seconded by Sharon Hershey. The motion carried.*

Sharon Hershey questioned where the committee stands on the radon issue. Bob's response was the committee's objective is to look into this during the next month. Ed Morris stated they feel the danger point is low to moderate. Primary concern when the tests were taken was the Pastor and Secretary's offices and children's classrooms, all on the lower level.

A motion was made by Sharon Hershey to accept the Commission Reports as printed and presented. The motion was seconded by Phyllis Fuhrman. The motion passed and all the reports were accepted.

Other Reports:

- A. Sue Ambrosius presented the Deacon Report as printed. She reminded those present about the slip attached at the back of the council packet requesting suggestions for candidates to serve as Deacons.
- B. The Membership Report was referred to as printed in the council packet.
- C. Memorial Gifts Report. Pastor Gerry advised the committee will be meeting to discuss the dollar amount being given to students. June 30, 2020, the amount given out was increased to \$500; however, the committee has been informed the Memorial Gift By-laws state a dollar limit per student of \$350. The committee will need to decide whether to return to the \$350 figure or amend the By-laws before scholarships are distributed in June.
- D. Lona Bridenbaugh presented the Women's Fellowship report as printed. Sharon Hershey announced she and Lona have been discussing whether to go ahead with a Christmas Craft Show in November. They will be meeting in June. Much church support is needed because of the intense amount of time and effort; at play is also not knowing at this time just how we would be able to handle the public.
- E. Youth Report. Pastor Gerry referred to the report as printed. She reaffirmed the help and support of the Youth Advisors during the restrictions affecting the group during the pandemic.
- F. Glow Group. Pastor Gerry presented the report as printed. She advised there is one new member coming into the group; however, several will be moving up to the Youth Group. Thanks was expressed to the congregation for the support shown to both the Youth and Glow Group.

A motion was made by Frank McDonald, seconded by Sue Ambroisus, to accept all the other reports as written and presented. The motion passed; all other reports were accepted.

Old Business:

A. Report on Faith in Action Grant: Pastor Gerry advised this grant was made available from the denomination through funds received from the sale of the New Windsor campus and interest raised since that time. Churches are allowed to request \$5,000 per year, but can only receive a total of \$15,000 per church. The funds received at HCOB were used to renovate the office for the Youth Director and also to remodel the Toddler Room which needed to be moved. This was an informative report only; no action was taken. Board members were reminded that there could still be funds available for future projects.

New Business:

A. Approve Changes to Child Protection Policy as recommended from Church Board: Melissa Godfrey presented the proposed changes to the present policy (Council Packet pages 18-23.) Priority from the group was that confidentiality be in place (addressed in Item 1, page 18). Following considerable discussion, the motion was made by Sharon Hershey, seconded by Phyllis Fuhrman, to change the proposed wording under Item 7 to read: "The mandatory reporter of child abuse in a church setting is the pastor. All other employees or volunteers need to report their suspicions to the Child Protection Committee." All other changes to the policy were accepted as proposed. The motion included a correction to change the numbering

of the second number 7 to 8: Policies, Guidelines, etc. – page 19 in the Council packet.

Scott Ruth advised anyone who has clearance under the Child Protection Act or deals with children on a regular basis is to be considered a Mandatory Reporter.

The above change allows anyone with a suspicion to report to one person or to the entire committee.

Anyone who reports a suspected incident will remain anonymous throughout any followup investigation.

Pastor Dick recommended when future church directories are printed they include the listing of the Child Protection Committee and all members.

A question was raised regarding the diapering area (Guidelines, Item 1, pg. 19): Should the privacy screen be removed due to this policy? The response was the privacy screen is there for nursing mothers, not diapering.

- B. Prioritize facility needs: Scott Ruth discussed the prioritized facility needs reviewed by the Church Board. An additional item added was to improve the Sound System in the Sanctuary. Scott explained the Board's decision to focus on improving the Sound System in the Fellowship Hall. A reminder was given that funding is not in place for this project; however, it was felt this improvement would be beneficial to both church members and outside organizations. Improvements would include an amplifier, microphone, projector and new screen. Approval is not necessary by the Council, but the Church Board is requesting Council permission to move ahead with the Fellowship Hall improvement. No motion was made, but a vote was taken to approve the improvement.
- C. Information Regarding Pastor's Retirement: Pastor Gerry informed the church board of her pending retirement from ministry on December 31, 2021 at their regular meeting Monday, May 10.

The Council Packet had been in place for handing out Sunday, May 9, making it impossible to include her retirement announcement in the packet.

A letter was sent out to inform the congregation. The Pastor-Congregation Support Team and Ministry & Worship Commission had been notified previously.

According to the Church By-laws the Ministry and Worship Commission is responsible to "call out" the Search Committee.

Scott Ruth reported he has been in contact with Rev. Dr. Bill Waugh, District Executive. Scott was informed:

The congregation must form a Search Committee. After the committee is in place, Rev. Waugh will meet with them.

Scott suggested since we recently had a Search Committee in place under Jim Replogle's leadership, the Ministry and Worship Commission may want to contact Jim and his previous committee members as a starting place.

Any other persons interested in serving on this Search Committee should contact the Ministry and Worship Commission.

Rev. Waugh's directive to Scott was that the main criteria for the committee is to be open to racial justice and diversity regarding age, gender, etc.

Pastor Gerry advised a necessary document to be created by the Search Committee is a Church Profile. This document is already in place, having been created by the former Search Committee.

The above was for information only; no action was taken.

Closing Prayer and Adjournment: After a time of sharing concerns and prayer, Pastor Dick adjourned the meeting at 8:27 PM.

B. Review of the Code of Ethics

As a part of the body of Christ, each congregation strives to act with integrity in its daily interactions with those outside of the church.

- 1. We strive to live by the gospel injunction that our yes be yes, and no be no, especially in regard to civil statutes. We honor the creative work of others by abiding with copyright permissions and compensating those who share their creative work with us.
- 2. We embody the traditional Brethren posture of separation of faith from politics by refraining from using our non-profit status to support political candidates.
- 3. We seek to maintain integrity with the business community by meeting invoice due dates, not abusing discount privileges, not soliciting gifts in a coercive or threatening way, and not competing unfairly with local businesses in the commerce of products and services.
- 4. Our integrity challenges us to work in a transparent manner to the extent that we avoid dual relationships or conflicts of interest in carrying out the work of the church.
- 5. We strive to be witnesses to Christ's peace in our relationships with one another and the wider community, especially in sharing our message and resources and how we speak to political issues of the day.

As part of the global body of Christ, each congregation seeks to be faithful to Christ's prayer for unity through prayer and support of the church locally, denominationally, and universally.

- 6. We seek to live out our covenant with the denomination and district, supporting local, national, and international program of the Church of the Brethren by sending delegates to Annual Conference and District Conference, through gifts of time and money, and most of all through our prayers.
- 7. We recognize that other Christian communities also are brothers and sisters in the family of God. We do not try to proselytize from sister communions. In regard to other religions, we seek to understand and be respectful of their beliefs and practices. While disagreement is inevitable, we seek to enter public conversations with grace and compassion rather than fear and mistrust.
- 8. We support causes and organizations that reflect the historical and theological understanding of the Church of the Brethren, and we avoid partnering with groups that may detract from our stated mission.

As a community of disciples following the way and teachings of Jesus Christ, the congregation seeks to treat one another with love and respect, conducting the business of the church openly and according to our beliefs.

- 9. We adequately compensate guest speakers, interim pastors, and other leaders who provide professional services for the congregation.
- 10. We are a people of reconciliation and seek to resolve disputes or concerns through peaceful means rather than resorting to public courts for a resolution.
- 11. We work to exhibit love and respect for every individual and ensure that every person has access to our facilities and ministries. We aim to be sensitive to persons with special needs and seek to accommodate them with adequate access to our worship and pastoral services.
- 12. We consciously seek harmony and unity in every aspect of our program and fellowship, striving for consensus in our decisions and relating to one another in the Spirit of Christ in the bond of love.

Our call to discipleship prompts us to encourage and instruct our members in maintaining lifestyles, attitudes, and actions that reflect the example and teachings of Christ.

- 13. We steward our time, talent, and treasure as resources for the common mission of Christ's church. Our leaders responsibly manage all the resources and funds entrusted to them in the course of their duties.
- 14. We address promptly incidents of dissent among us and have a method in place for seeking resolution and reconciliation.
- 15. We cultivate a spirit of thanksgiving and generosity in all of our life, especially expressing our gratitude to all those who make a significant contribution to the church's work and worship, for all that we have is a gift from God.
- 16. We endeavor to maintain an environment and program free of sexual, psychological, or physical abuse and harassment, giving special attention to the protection of children, the elderly, and the disabled. In the event of an accusation of abuse or harassment we deal with it forthrightly, promptly, and fairly, in order to stop the behavior in question, minister to all victims, effect change in the violator, and seek reconciliation.

The work of a congregation, especially the contractual agreements with staff, creates unique ethical questions (fiduciary responsibility).

- 17. We strive to be fair and equitable in support of our staff, adopting the *Guidelines for Pastor's Salaries and Benefits* as our guide for determining adequate compensation. When diverting from these guidelines, we adjust expectations and time requirements appropriate to scale.
- 18. We provide a supportive and nurturing culture for our staff through an advisory committee that meets regularly with staff members in an advocacy and counseling capacity. This group will facilitate regular opportunities for performance evaluation of all staff by providing opportunities for appropriate congregational input.
- 19. We value the ministry of our current pastoral leadership and discourage our members from inviting former pastors to return to perform pastoral functions such as weddings and funerals. We treat friendships with former pastors with special care so as not to undermine the ministry of current pastoral leadership.
- 20. We strive to be open and transparent in our organization and rely on the ministry of all believers in our midst by identifying and nurturing the gifts and skills of our members. We expect our leaders to execute the duties of their office in accordance with congregational bylaws. We entrust our leaders with the work of the church and expect them to avoid asserting undue influence in the matters of the congregation or seeking favors by nature of their position.
- 21. We conduct business openly, except when the agenda may deal with confidential personnel matters, and expect transparent and honest dialogue from all our members at all times. We ask that members not seek to influence decisions outside of established open forums through alternative or closed meetings, or by campaigns through alternate means such as letters, phone calls, email, or social media.
- 22. We hold our property and finances in trust for the denomination. We care for them as our own and have provisions in the deeds and bylaws of the congregation to identify the district or its successor as the recipient of all property and finances in case the congregation disbands or leaves the denomination.

Motion: We as the congregation pledge to follow these guidelines.

C. Recommendation from Church Board to recommend approval for Minister of Visitation Position

The Ministry and Worship Commission recommends to the board the position of Ministry of Visitation and the job description that goes with it as a part-time position and for Pastor Gerry to fill that position after her retirement from full-time ministry on December 31 2021; subject to council approval and subject to interim/new pastor approvals. Approved to recommend by Church Board on June 14, 2021.

Minister of Visitation Job Description

Responsible to: Ministry and Worship Commission, Sr. Pastor of Hanover COB, Church Board, Church Council, Southern PA District COB, the Denomination **Purpose of Position:**

- To keep shut-ins and nursing home people connected to the Hanover COB
- To assist the Senior Pastor with visitation when the workload is heavy or when pastor is on vacation

Position: Part-time 15 - 20 hours a month **Oualifications:**

- Training in ministry or ordination in the Church of the Brethren
- Previous pastoral experience
- Developing a collegial relationship with the current Senior Pastor

Responsibilities:

- Visit shut-ins and nursing home residents once a month or as directed
- Visit inactive members in consultation with the Deacons and Sr. Pastor Be pro-active with any persons who visit the church who may be potential members
- Keep the Senior Pastor informed concerning new people
- Visit hospitalized members when Senior Pastor is on vacation
- Communication with the Sr. Pastor is very important

Rationale: To take a portion of the heavy load off of the Senior Pastor. As I have ministered here for 13 years, there is a lot of work for one pastor at Hanover COB. The desire to have a Director of Youth or a Youth Pastor did not work out and that would have lightened the load for Hanover's Senior Pastor. I am looking to fill what I perceive as a need at Hanover COB so that your new pastor can possibly become involved with the youth program and strengthen that area.
