### Mean God or Nice God?

We brethren have a saying about our beliefs: "No creed but the New Testament." It was a reaction against the politicized churches of the day (early 1700s) when Alexander Mack and his friends began the Brethren movement by taking a fresh look at Scripture. They were unimpressed with the lives of those who professed to know God through their creeds, yet seemed to live otherwise. War and corruption seemed to dominate the agendas of the leaders of the Catholic, Lutheran and Calvinist churches. Old Testament scriptures were often used to support the various religious wars those churches were involved in. Mack and his friends saw this as contradictory to the teachings of Jesus. So, while they did not reject the Old Testament, they did *emphasize* the teachings of the New Testament.

We today still tend to prefer the teachings of Jesus to some of the more violent stories of the Old Testament. In fact if most of us are honest, we really don't understand why God seems so violent and angry in the Old Testament, and by contrast so nice and forgiving in the new. But a closer look at Scripture – and that is always a good idea – reveals that we really don't have two different gods, or even two different manifestations of God, but *one* God, revealing himself in different ways. In the Old Testament, we see God trying to convince a group of desert people known as the Hebrews that He loves them and wants to be their God and father and King and leader. They respond in pretty typical fashion, sometimes saying yes, sometimes saying no, sometimes saying yes with their lips and no with their actions, etc. (See Isaiah 29:13) Sound familiar?








### Wednesday, May 15 Noon to 2 PM

entertained by a musical group from Hanover High School. Don't forget to bring a covered dish to share!!



### From the Desk of Pastor Mark continued

For many years, God did act directly as the King of Israel, using a series of judges to administrate the kingdom. But people soon grew weary of this and looked to their neighbors-claiming they wanted to have a king just as their neighbors did. God warned them that that would not be a good system (See 1 Samuel 8). But they insisted, and so they got what they asked for - a powerful centralized government with all the corruption and fuss that goes along with it. Again, sound familiar?

And what about all that war? Mennonite author John Howard Yoder makes a point about all that Old Testament violence that's not readily apparent. You see, every time Israel faced an enemy in the Old Testament, God said that He would defeat the enemy for them if they trusted Him. Yes, they sometimes used military means, but always as a minority. In fact, Israel never won a battle with superior forces. God said, and meant, "I will fight for you" (See Exodus 14:13-14). When they trusted that and acted according to His will, they won. When they took matters into their own hands and try to attack with a superior force, they lost.

Towards the end of the Old Testament, when the people of Israel are finally defeated and carried away into exile, we again see that that was not ever God's intention, but rather the consequence of the disobedience and apathy of the people of Israel. God simply let them experience the consequences of their laziness and lack of focus on Him. Greedy neighbors, hungry for land and wealth, simply took advantage of the divided kingdom, weakened by internal strife brought on by their lack of unity and focus on YHWH.

#### So what?

So what does this have to do with us today? Well, honestly, we still struggle with this question of whether God is mean or nice. When we see other people 'getting away with murder,' we look to God to be a little mean. But when we sin, whether with our minds or mouths, our eyes, our hands or feet, we hope that, in fact, He is a little *nicer* than that. The truth is, He is a terrifying judge to those who stand unforgiven, and yet a tender Father to those who repent (who admit they need Him)! When we continually ignore Him, or simply keep Him at the margins of our lives, insisting that we can handle it, the consequences eventually but inevitably come. Make no mistake, we still belong to Him. We are still His sons and daughters, but when we leave Him out of our daily routine, we are, in a sense, 'on our own.'

Now, that doesn't mean that everything that happens to us is our fault- or His judgment (See John 9)! We live in a broken world that He hasn't been back to fix yet. But until that time, He promises that He is with us at all times no matter what, and that is pretty amazing!

When we realize what we (and the people of ancient Israel) truly deserve as sinners (See Romans 6:23), we realize God is not mean, and never has been. He is simply a very, very good judgeand very merciful at that! For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son...

You think about that, amen!


